TO ALL PARTIES AND COUNSEL OF RECORD:

The Court issues this Order with respect to several items on the docket:

1. Pending Stipulations

Having reviewed the pending stipulations on the docket, and for the good cause shown therein, the Court **GRANTS** the following pending stipulations:

- Dkt. Nos. 641, 682
 - The Clerk of the Court shall admit into evidence the exhibits identified in these stipulations. All exhibits shall be posted to the public box except for those in which the parties have identified any potential sealing issue. Those documents for which the Court has issued a definitive ruling (*i.e.* a ruling other than deferred) shall be placed into the public box in conformance with the Court’s Orders (or shall be appropriately withheld in the event that the entirety of the document is appropriately sealed).

2. Briefing Schedule Re: Motion for Judgment on Partial Findings (Dkt. No. 707)

The Court sets the following briefing schedule on the motion for judgment on partial findings: plaintiff Epic Games, Inc.’s response shall be filed on or before **Sunday, May 23, 2021 at 12:00 PM PDT**. Defendant Apple Inc. may file a reply (optional) on or before **Wednesday,**

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1 **3. Week 2 Sealing Requests**

2 The Court has received several new requests to seal from both the parties and third parties.

3 As the Court explained in Pretrial Orders 7 and 9, as well as Trial Orders 1 and 5:

4 Local Rule 79-5 provides that documents, or portions thereof, may be
5 sealed if a party “establishes that the documents, or portions thereof,
6 are privileged, protectable as a trade secret, or otherwise entitled to
7 protection under the law.” Civ. L. R. 79-5(b). In general, a “strong
8 presumption in favor of access” to court records exists, especially
9 during trial. At times, compelling reasons which are “sufficient to
10 outweigh the public’s interest in disclosure and justify sealing court
11 records exist when such ‘court files might have become a vehicle for
12 improper purposes,’ such as the use of records to . . . release trade
13 secrets.” *Kamakana v. City and Cty. of Honolulu*, 447 F.3d 1172,
14 1178 (9th Cir. 2006) (quoting *Nixon v. WarnerCommc’ns, Inc.*, 435
15 U.S. 589, 598 (1978) (“[C]ourts have refused to permit their files to
16 serve as . . . sources of business information that might harm a
17 litigant’s competitive standing”).

18 Here, and importantly, the gravamen of this case *is* business
19 competition, including whether competition exists; if so, among
20 which players; and how such competition influences the market. The
21 Court understands that the standard is more lenient when the
22 information concerns third parties, but this is not dispositive. The
23 third-party information must be balanced with the Court’s ultimate
24 resolution of the instant dispute which should be transparent in its
25 analysis. Accordingly, the Court makes the following findings based
26 upon the current state of the record:¹

27 (Dkt. No. 547 at 1-2; Dkt. No. 564 at 1-2; Dkt. No. 594 at 2-3; Dkt. No. 643 at 2-3.)² With this

30 important to disclose which has been sealed, it will provide an opportunity for the moving party to
31 respond.

32 ² The Court similarly stated in Trial Order No. 3:

33 Trial records enjoy a “strong presumption in favor of access” that can
34 only be overcome by “compelling reasons supported by specific
35 factual findings that outweigh the general history of access and the
36 public policies favoring disclosure.” *Kamakana v. City & Cty. of
37 Honolulu*, 447 F.3d 1172, 1178- 79 (9th Cir. 2006). “In general,
38 ‘compelling reasons’ sufficient to outweigh the public’s interest in
39 disclosure and justify sealing court records exist when such ‘court
40 files might have become a vehicle for improper purposes,’ such as the
41 use of records to gratify private spite, promote public scandal,
42 circulate libelous statements, or release trade secrets.” *Id.* at 1179
43 (quoting *Nixon v. Warner Commc’ns, Inc.*, 435 U.S. 589, 598 (1978)).

1 prior framework in mind, the Court addresses the below administrative motions to seal.

2 a. Spotify USA Inc.’s Administrative Motions to Seal (Dkt. No. 649, 692)

3 The Court **GRANTS** non-party Spotify USA Inc.’s administrative motions to seal portions
4 of the document with bates numbers SPOT-EPIC-00000925 and SPOT-EPIC-00001023 (Dkt. No.
5 649), and of the document with bates number SPOT-EPIC-00001047. (Dkt. No. 692.) These
6 documents reflect highly confidential information including recent internal user data, the release
7 of which would competitively harm Spotify.

8 b. Apple’s Administrative Motion to Seal (Week 2) (Dkt. No. 659)

9 The motion is **GRANTED** as to all documents except for:

- 10 • PX-602
 - 11 ○ 602.27: the notes shall be unredacted except that the words after “WW
 - 12 games business” shall be redacted and sealed up until the comma. The
 - 13 remainder of the sentence after the comma and the notes shall be
 - 14 unredacted. The remainder of the proposed redactions on this page is
 - 15 appropriately sealed.
 - 16 ○ 602.32: the first bullet point shall be unredacted in the notes section. The
 - 17 remainder of the proposed redactions on this page are appropriately sealed.
 - 18 ○ The remainder of the proposed redactions in this document is appropriately
 - 19 sealed.
- 20 • PX-608
 - 21 ○ 608.13: the slide shall be unredacted except that the percentage may remain
 - 22 redacted and sealed.
 - 23 ○ The remainder of the proposed redactions in this document is appropriately
 - 24 sealed.
- 25 • PX-2176
 - 26 ○ 2176.48: this page shall be unredacted.
 - 27 ○ 2176.64: this page shall be unredacted.
 - 28 ○ 2176.72: this slide shall be unredacted except that the monetary amounts

- 1 may be redacted and sealed. The categories in the notes shall be
2 unredacted, but the remainder of the notes section is appropriately sealed
3 (including the text following these categories after the “- ”).
- 4 ○ 2176.74: this slide shall be unredacted except that the monetary amounts
5 may be redacted and sealed. The categories in the notes shall be
6 unredacted, but the remainder of the notes section is appropriately sealed
7 (including the text following these categories after the “- ”).
- 8 ○ 2176.176: this slide shall be unredacted. The first four bullet points in the
9 notes section shall be unredacted. The line “Spend Segment” shall be
10 unredacted, along with the categories of the bullet points below that line.
11 The percentages and the amounts that follow these categories shall be
12 redacted and sealed. The final note at the bottom shall be unredacted.
- 13 ○ 2176.177: this page shall be unredacted.
- 14 ○ 2176.178: this page shall be unredacted.
- 15 ○ 2176.180: the title of the slide shall be unredacted. The remainder of the
16 proposed redactions on this page is appropriately sealed.
- 17 ○ 2176.181: this page shall be unredacted.
- 18 ○ 2176.192: this page shall be unredacted.
- 19 ○ The remainder of the proposed redactions in this document is appropriately
20 sealed.
- 21 ● DX-4800
- 22 ○ Given the testimony and other unsealed documents, this page shall be
23 unredacted except that the Samsung Electronics Co. Ltd. and Gearbox
24 Software LLC commission rates shall be redacted and sealed.
- 25 ● DX-4094
- 26 ○ 4094.007: The first two sentences in the notes shall be unredacted on this
27 slide. The remainder on this slide shall be sealed.
- 28 ○ The remainder of the proposed redactions in this document is appropriately

2 • DX-4170

- 3 ○ This document is sealed. However, the parties are on notice that the Court
4 may cite to certain statistics contained within the document in any final
5 order on the merits in this action.

6 c. Epic Games' Administrative Motion to Seal (Week 2) (Dkt. No. 660)

7 The motion is **GRANTED** as to all documents except for:

8 • DX-4800

- 9 ○ See above in the Apple section for the appropriate redactions.

10 • DX-5549 and DX-5550

- 11 ○ The Court has reviewed Spotify's declaration in support of the sealing of
12 certain information in these documents. (*See* Dkt. Nos. 680 (declaration),
13 681 (proposed redactions).) The Court approves of Spotify's proposed
14 redactions of these documents, which are narrowly tailored.

15 d. Sony Interactive Entertainment LLC's Administrative Motion to Seal (Dkt. No. 663)

16 Having reviewed Sony Interactive Entertainment LLC's renewed administrative motion to
17 seal, the Court will follow the example set by Judge Lucy Koh in *Apple, Inc. v. Samsung Elecs.*
18 *Co.*, No. 11-CV-01846-LHK, 2012 WL 3283478, at *13 (N.D. Cal. Aug. 9, 2012), *rev'd and*
19 *remanded on other grounds*, 727 F.3d 1214 (Fed. Cir. 2013). The Court considers the extent to
20 which the inadvertently disclosed documents have been publicized, weighs the public's right of
21 access to these documents considering the merits of this action, and balances these considerations
22 against any potential competitive harm to Sony. The motion is therefore **GRANTED** as follows:

23 • DX-3660 (Ex. A)

- 24 ○ Although this agreement was identified as one document that was
25 inadvertently disclosed by the parties, the Court agrees to limited proposed
26 redactions. Thus, the proposed redactions are sealed except as follows:

- 27 ■ Section 1.2: The sentence defining "Competitive Platform" shall be

28 ~~redacted. The remainder in this section is otherwise sealed.~~

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
