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SkyTel takes two-way paging nationwide

SkyTel today unveils the first nationwide two-way paging system, launching a cheap mobile-messaging industry that will involve companies such as Sony and AT&T. Even major automakers will build messaging devices into cars. "This is a breakthrough," consultant Jeffrey Kagan says. "A year from now you'll see so many new paging services, you can't even imagine them." SkyTel's system will be up and running today in 150 metropolitan regions. By year's end, the system will cover 225 metro regions, says Bernard Tuckett, CEO of Mobile Telecommunications
