

n. A word history: The plural of child is really a double plural, and neither plural suffix belongs to the original declension of the word. The earliest Old English form cild was a neuter noun that formed the plural by adding no suffix, like the Modern English words sheep and deer. Other neuter nouns, however, formed plurals by suffixing —ra, and in later Old English times a new plural, cildru, was used for cild. This form developed into childer. In Old English still another class of nouns formed the plural with the suffix —an, which survived in Middle English as —en. Oxen and brethren are modern plurals that show this suffix, and it was added to childer to make it conform to other nouns. Childeren was probably pronounced children, which became the modern spelling of the plural of child.
