I like that the vibration effects and sensitivity are

adjustable. And it's got a cup holder and a storage bin for my gamepad and Sno-Balls.

But after that, the excitement starts to peter away. The built-in speakers sound like a cheap desktop set, and the volume slider seems poorly calibrated, so it has little effect

between the settings of ear-shattering and nearly muted. The chair cannot be raised any further off the ground, making it awkward to use with a desktop display and almost impossible to use with a mouse, and tilting it back is difficult without first removing the detachable armrests.

Typing of the Dead on a laptop with the vibration effects rattling the fillings out of your teeth may be this chair's killer app. But it's a lot of money for a chair from which few PC gamers will get their money's worth.

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
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## THE TREY CHAIR

It's a spectacularly comfortable console gaming throne to drop in front of the television when it's slouched into rocker/footrest mode, and it's a firm, upright PC gaming chair at your desk that's height-, tilt-, and tilt tension-adjustable (as I'd expect from a chair at this price). The fabric upholstery feels a bit plasticky and harsh, but otherwise, the Trey is cleverly designed, sturdy, and practical. In fact, it's one of the coolest upgrades you can buy for your ass.
