

SkyTel today unveils the first nationwide two-way paging system, launching a cheap mobile-messaging industry that will involve companies such as Sony and AT&T. Even major automakers will build messaging devices into cars.

"This is a breakthrough," consultant Jeffrey Kagan says. "A year from now you'll see so many new paging services, you can't even imagine them.

SkyTel's system will be up and running today in 150 metropolitan regions. By year's end, the system will cover 225 metro regions, says Bernard Tuckett, CEO of Mobile Telecommunications

Technologies. SkyTel is an Mtel division.

How it works: A caller dials an 800 number and leaves a message with an operator, who types the message into the system. Or, a PC user could send a message to the pager using electronic mail. The pager can receive text messages of up to 500 characters and dis-

play them on a tiny screen.

Encoded in the devices are a number of ready-made replies, such as "OK" and "Be there in 15." Users pick a reply and hit a button to send it. Or they can

plug the pager into a laptop PC and type a reply of up to 95 characters. Replies can travel back several ways, including to another pager or via the Internet to a PC.

Users can buy the Sky-Tel 2-Way device for \$399 or rent one for \$15 a month. For service, the lowest level would allow a user to receive unlimit-

ed messages in a region and send 100 replies a month for \$24.95. The top level allows unlimited messages nationwide and 200 replies a month for \$74.95.

But SkyTel's service is only the begin-

ning, analysts say. Competitors AT&T and MobileComm are rushing to get into two-way messaging. That should drive down prices, creating "the next hot application - cheap, wireless email," says Bill Bane of Mercer Management Consulting. Also coming:

Portable PCs with built-in, two-way messaging. Cards that slide into the PCs will be ready in a year, CEO Tuckett says. Chips that put the capability inside the machines will come after that.


