education

Teaching concepts and perspectives. Computer education includes computer systems and information systems. Contrast with *training*.

edutainment

Educational material that is also entertaining.

EEPROM

(Electrically Erasable Programmable Read Only Memory) A memory chip that holds its content without power. It can be erased, either within the computer or externally and usually requires more voltage for erasure than the common +5 volts used in logic circuits. It functions like non-volatile RAM, but writing to EEPROM is slower than writing to RAM.

EEPROMs are used in devices that must keep data up-to-date without power. For example, a price list could be maintained in EEPROM chips in a point of sale terminal that is turned off at night. When prices change, the EEPROMs can be updated from a central computer during the day. EEPROMs have a lifespan of between 10K and 100K write cycles. See *flash memory*.

e-forms

(Electronic-FORMS) See *forms software*.

EFT

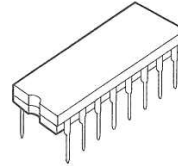
(Electronic Funds Transfer) The transfer of money from one account to another by computer.

EGA

(Enhanced Graphics Adapter) An IBM video display standard that provides medium-resolution text and graphics. It supports previous display modes and requires a digital RGB Enhanced Color Display or equivalent monitor. EGA was superseded by VGA. See *PC display modes*.

EGP

(Exterior Gateway Protocol) A protocol that broadcasts TCP/IP addresses to the gateway in another network.
