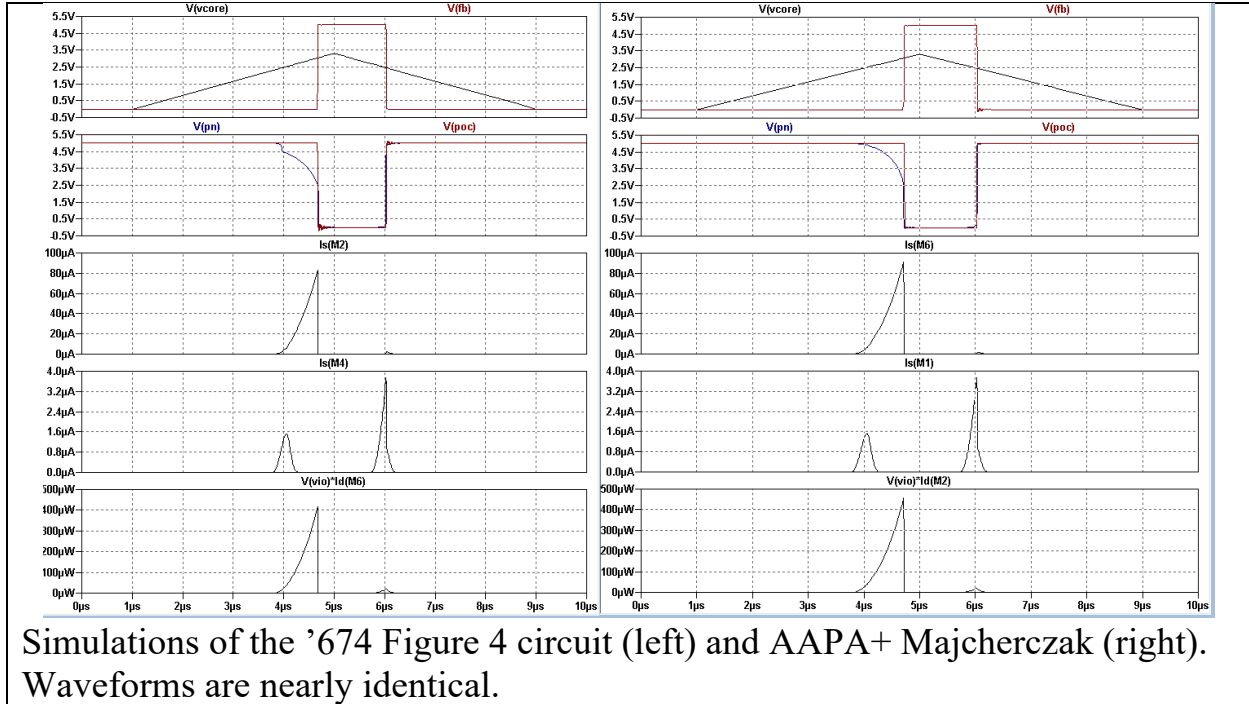

**CORRECTIVE DECLARATION OF ROBERT W. HORST, PH.D.**


