commencing at 1:00 p.m., at the United States Patent and Trademark Office,
USPTO Madison Building, 600 Dulany Street, Alexandria, VA 22314.

2 JUDGE MELVIN: Okay. Good afternoon. We're here
3 for a hearing in IPR2018-01350. Will the parties please make
4 their appearances?

5 MR. ARGENTI: Good afternoon, Your Honor. Matt
6 Argenti from Wilson Sonsini on behalf of Petitioner in the
7 matter, Visa. With me at counsel table is Jamie Otto.

8 JUDGE MELVIN: Thank you.

9 MR. MATHEWS: Good afternoon, Your Honors. Chris
10 Mathews on behalf of Patent Owner, USR. With me today are two
11 of my partners. Lead counsel, James Glass and Tigran
12 Guledjian. Also in attendance from USR, USR CEO Dr. Kenneth
13 Weiss, and USR's president, Arthur Hagopian.

14 JUDGE MELVIN: Thank you.

15 MS. GREWAL: Good afternoon. Monica Grewal on
16 behalf of Petitioner, Apple Inc.

17 JUDGE MELVIN: Okay. So as you all know, you each
18 have 45 minutes and you may reserve time for your rebuttal.
19 As you -- as is inherent, we have remote judges, so please
20 remember to refer to the written materials and to speak into
21 the microphone so that we have a clear record.

22 How much time would Petitioner like to reserve?

23 MR. ARGENTI: I'd like to reserve 20 minutes.

24 JUDGE MELVIN: Okay. And Patent Owner?

25 MR. MATHEWS: Right now, I imagine I'd like to

1 reserve 10 minutes.

2 JUDGE MELVIN: Okay. Okay. Well, I'll set up the
3 timer so that your rebuttal will be when the light goes
4 yellow, okay? I'll trust that you can manage your time.

5 MR. ARGENTI: Before you hit start on the timer, one
6 administrative matter.

7 JUDGE MELVIN: Of course.

8 MR. ARGENTI: Given that we have remote judges
9 participating, my plan is to not use the screen to display our
10 demonstratives. I'll be referring to them in hard copy form.
11 I also have a hard copy I could distribute if it would be
12 helpful, but we did file the demonstratives.

13 JUDGE MELVIN: Yeah, absolutely. I -- we all have
14 copies of the demonstratives. I have no need for them to be
15 on the screen, so I'm happy to just use my copy here.

16 MR. ARGENTI: Great, thanks.

17 JUDGE MELVIN: So whenever you're ready, Mr.
18 Argenti.

19 MR. ARGENTI: Great. Thank you.

20 Good afternoon, Your Honors. Turning to Slide 2 of
21 our demonstratives, we see the instituted grounds in this
22 proceeding. All of the challenged claims of the '539 Patent
23 are obvious in view of the combination of three references,
24 Brener, Desai, and Weiss. And as I will explain in a bit, the
25 Desai reference is not necessary to find the claims obvious

1 under the proper interpretation of the claims.

2 Turning to Slide 3, the challenged '539 Patent
3 relates to a system used to selectively provide personal
4 information to authorized parties. As we see in Figure 8 on
5 Slide 3, the system can be used to allow a user to purchase
6 goods from a merchant without divulging the user's name,
7 identity, or sensitive information such as a credit card
8 number to the merchant.

9 This is accomplished through use of a secret code
10 that corresponds to the user. The user provides the secret
11 code to the merchant, the merchant passes that on to the
12 secure registry system; at which point the secret code is then
13 used to determine the customer's account number, name,
14 address, other information, and work in conjunction with, for
15 example, a bank or a shipping company.

16 The '539 Patent also explains that the secure
17 registry can be used to maintain the customer's anonymity when
18 shipping the goods. The merchant doesn't need to know the
19 customer's address, a third party shipper receives the address
20 and enables completion of the transaction by shipping the
21 goods.

22 Now, turning to Slide 4, which is representative
23 Claim 1 of the '539 Patent. All of the challenged claims
24 specify that that secret code I just mentioned is a
25 time-varying multicharacter code. Now, that's nothing new.

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
