## PRONUNCIATION KEY

Stress. The symbol ('), as in mother (muth'or), and red' wine', marks primary stress; any syllable immediately followed by ( ${ }^{( }$) is pronounced with greater emphasis than syllables not marked('). The symbol ('), as used following the
second syllables of grandmother (grand'muth'rr), and ice' wa'ter, marks sec ondary stress; a syllable marked for secondary stress is pronounced with less emphasis than one marked ( $)$ but with more than those bearing no stress mark
