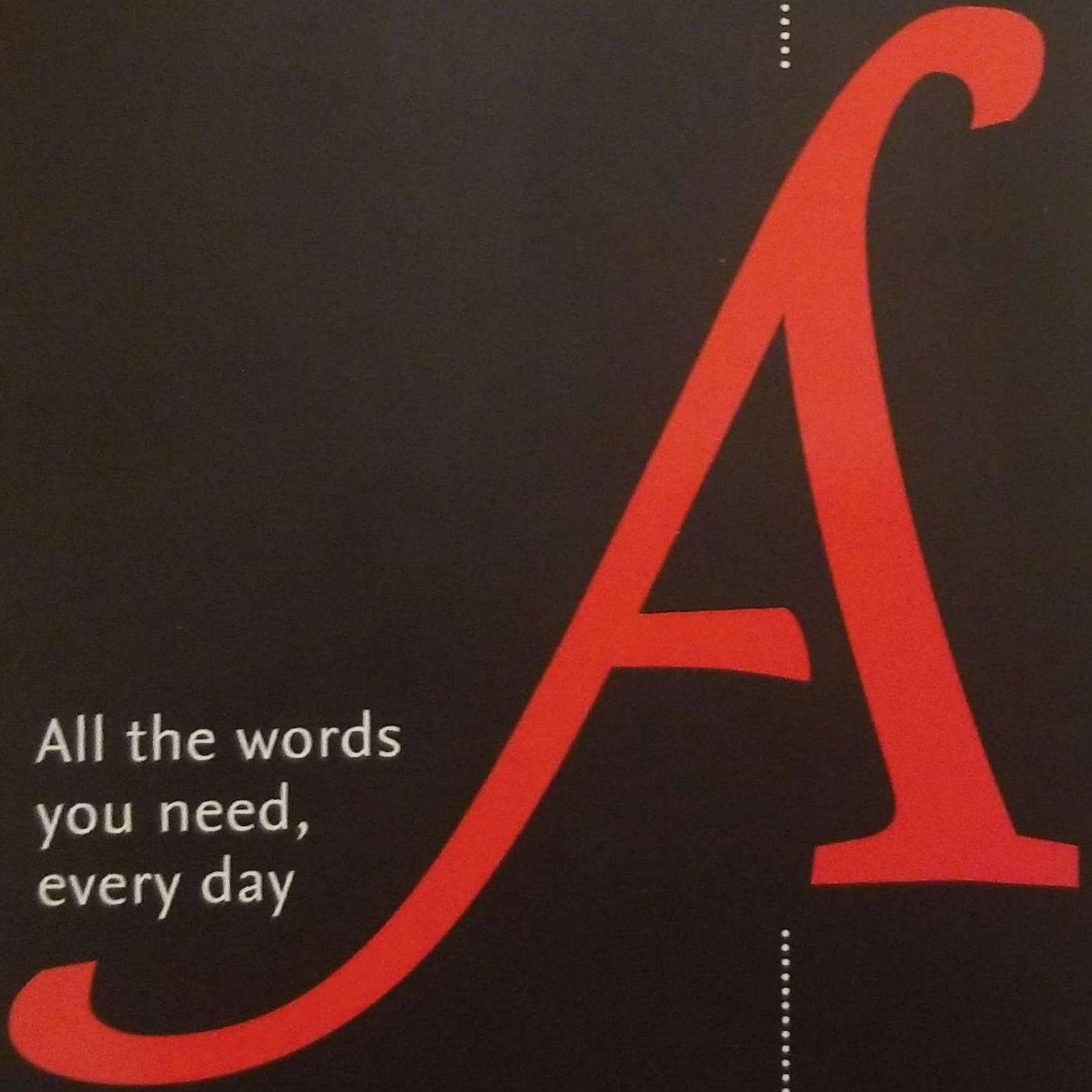

**got** *vb* 1 the past of **get** 2 **have got** to possess 3 **have got to** must: *you have got to be prepared to work hard*

**Gothic** *adj* 1 of a style of architecture used in W Europe from the 12th to the 16th centuries, characterized by pointed arches, ribbed vaults, and flying buttresses 2 of a literary style featuring stories of gloom, horror, and the supernatural, popular in the late 18th century 3 of or in a heavy ornate script typeface > *n* 4 Gothic architecture or art [Greek *Gothoi*]

**go through** *vb* 1 to experience (a difficult time or process) 2 to name or describe: *the president went through a list of government ministers* 3 to qualify for the next stage of a competition: *Belgium, Spain and Uruguay all went through from Group E* 4 to be approved: *the bill went through parliament* 5 **go through with** to bring to a successful conclusion, often by persistence

**gotten** *vb* chiefly US a past participle of **get**

**gouache** *n* opaque watercolour paint bound with glue [French]

**Gouda** *n* a round mild-flavoured Dutch cheese

**gouge** (*gowj*) *vb* **gouging, gouged** 1 to scoop or force (something) out of its position 2 to cut (a hole or groove) in something with a pointed object > *n* 3 a mark or groove made by gouging [French]

**goulash** (*goo-lash*) *n* a rich stew seasoned with paprika, originating in Hungary [Hungarian *gulyás* *hus* herdsman's meat]

**gourd** (*goord*) *n* 1 a large hard-shelled fruit similar to a cucumber or marrow 2 a container made from a dried gourd shell [Old French *gourde*]

**gourmand** (*goor-mand*) *n* a person devoted to eating and drinking, usually to excess [Old French *gourmant*]

**gourmet** (*goor-may*) *n* an expert on good food and drink [French]

**gout** (*gowt*) *n* a disease that causes painful inflammation of certain joints, for example of the big toe [Latin *gutta* a drop] **gouty** *adj*

**govern** *vb* 1 to direct and control the policy and affairs of (a country or an organization) 2 to control or determine: *the international organizations governing athletics and rugby* [Latin *gubernare* to steer] **governable** *adj*

**governance** *n* government, control, or authority

**governess** *n* a woman employed in a private household to teach the children

**government** *n* 1 the executive policy-making

**governor general** *n, pl governors general* or **governor generals** the chief representative of the British government in a Commonwealth country

**go with** *vb* 1 to blend or harmonize with: *the style goes well with modern art* 2 to be linked with: *respect goes with age*

**go without** *vb* to be denied or deprived of: *no-one should go without food*

**gown** *n* 1 a woman's long formal dress 2 a surgeon's overall 3 a loose wide official robe worn by clergymen, judges, lawyers, and academics [Late Latin *gunna* garment made of fur]

**goy** *n, pl goyim* or **goys** a Jewish word for a Gentile [Yiddish]

**GP** general practitioner

**GP** (in Britain) Graphical, Paper and Media Union

**GPO** (in Britain and Australia) general post office

**GPS** Global Positioning System: a satellite-based navigation system

**Graafian follicle** *n anat* a cavity in the ovary that contains a developing egg cell [after R. de Graaf, anatomist]

**grab** *vb* **grabbing, grabbed** 1 to seize hold of 2 to take (food, drink, or rest) hurriedly 3 to take (an opportunity) eagerly 4 to seize illegally or unscrupulously: *land grabbing* 5 *informal* to interest or impress > *n* 6 the act of grabbing [probably from Middle Dutch *graben*]

**grab bag** *n* 1 a collection of miscellaneous things 2 US, *Canad* & *Austral* a bag from which gifts are drawn at random

**grace** *n* 1 elegance and beauty of movement, form, or expression 2 a pleasing or charming quality: *architecture with few redeeming graces* 3 courtesy or decency: *at least she had the grace to laugh* 4 a delay granted for the completion of a task or payment of a debt: *another year's grace* 5 *Christian theol* the free and unmerited favour of God shown towards humankind 6 a short prayer of thanks for a meal 7 **airs and graces** an affected manner 8 **with bad grace** unwillingly or grudgingly: *independence was granted with bad grace* 9 **with good grace** willingly or ungrudgingly: *to accept with good grace* > *vb* **gracing, graced** 10 to honour or favour: *graced by the presence of Henry Ford* 11 to decorate or make more attractive: *bedsit walls graced by Che Guevara and James Dean* [Latin *gratia*]

**Grace** *n* **Your or His or Her Grace** a title used to address or refer to a duke, duchess, or archbishop

**graceful** *adj* having beauty of movement, style, or form **gracefully** *adv* **gracefulness** *n **graceless** *adj* 1 lacking elegance 2 lacking manners*
