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

 Syn CovETOUS, GREEDY, ACQUISITIVE, GRASPING, AVARICIOUS mean having or showing a strong desire for esp. material possessions, cov-ETOUS implies inordinate desire often for another's possessions (covETOUS) in both esperies often for another's possessions (covETOUS) and often of discrimination in desire (greedy for status symbols) and QUISITIVE implies both eagerness to possess and ability to acquire and keep (an eagerly acquisitive mind). GRASPING adds to COVETOUS and GREEDY an implication of selfishness and often suggests unfair or ruthless means (a hard grasping trader who cheated the natives). AvA RICIOUS implies obsessive acquisitiveness esp. of money and strongly suggests stilnginess (an avaricious miser).
