I, James DiNatale, hereby declare:

1. I am currently a Research Librarian at Foley & Lardner LLP.
2. Exhibit 2092 from the Hall-Ellis Deposition (EX2094 at 63-65) is a true and correct copy of an email I forwarded to attorney Steve Maebius at Foley & Lardner LLP, sharing the response I received from Mr. Rupert Lee of the BIPC Research Services team at the British Library.
3. This response from the British Library was made pursuant to a request for this information from Mr. Maebius. After he made the request, I visited the web site of the British Library (<https://www.bl.uk/business-and-ip-centre/our-research-service>) to locate a contact number. From this web site, I located a phone number (011-44-207412-7903), which I called to discuss with a British Library employee. The employee gave me another number (01 1-44-207412-7014), to reach a researcher and I was able to speak with Seema Rampersad. Seema Rampersad provided an email address for me to further discuss Mr. Maebius' requests with the British Library, which ultimately led to the response from the British Library presented in Hall-Ellis Deposition Exhibit 2092.
4. In addition, the British Library's own web site indicates that

ordering items in advance of visiting their reading rooms is an established procedure that is consistent with the answers provided to me in the email I received on April 20, 2018. See <https://www.bl.uk/help/how-to-order-items> (accessed by me on May 17, 2018). For example, this web page states as follows: “To order items to view in our Reading Rooms you must have first registered for a Reader Pass” (underlining added).

5. I hereby declare that all statements made herein of my knowledge are true and that all statements made on information and belief are believed to be true; and further that these statements were made with the knowledge that willful false statements and the like so made are punishable by fine or imprisonment, or both under Section 1001 of Title 18 of the United States Code.
