a drawing of the earth's surface, or part of that surface, showing the shape and position of different countries, political borders, natural features such as rivers and mountains, and artificial features such as roads and buildings:

- a map **of** the world
- a map of Paris
- a **road** map
- We need a large-scale map showing all the trails that we can walk on.
- I'm terrible at map **reading** (= understanding maps).

a drawing that gives you a particular type of information about a particular area:

- He bought a map showing the population distribution of Scotland.

- *Parts of the mountainous region in the north of the country have still not been mapped.*



to represent how the parts of something are organized or arranged:

- *The first human genome was mapped in 2003.*










to connect a set of values to another similar set, using a particular method or rule:

- *The motherboard is responsible for decoding the virtual addresses and mapping them to physical addresses.*
- *The findings suggest that children learn these words and map them **onto** concepts already present.*
